We will be having a scenic drive to Steve and Ann Womack's in Eastern Kentucky. More details on page 31.



This year has flown by. As I look to update the following list of Upcoming Track Events of Interest, I notice the list is now shrinking as opposed to The good news is that the expanding. cycle continues and we'll soon be faced with another racing off-season. **Perhaps** you're lucky enough to be considering a new track toy or current car replacement this off-season. Sooner or later, all track iunkies have the excitement and consternation associated with a new track Many of us have buddies that vehicle. should experience such excitement a little more frequently as well (sorry, I'm drifting off-topic). If you fall into this category, this month's installment is for you.

As a current track event participant, I have no doubt you have a mile long list of shortcomings of your current vehicle. We never have enough horsepower, downforce, braking power, etc. etc. On the other hand, have you considered all of the positives of your current track car? By the time you consider the next vehicle, the current one has likely undergone a metamorphosis through time. Perhaps you have upgraded suspension, seating, safety equipment, power, tuning, or exhaust. One at a time, such upgrades are barely perceptible, but as a whole, your car is different.

While upgrades in components have changed your vehicle (likely a track killer but a street challenge), have you considered the adaptation of the driver that has taken place as well? As much as we change our vehicle to suit our needs, we adapt our driving style to optimize the results of the car. What does this have to do with my next track day machine? It has

everything to do with it. If you are like most of us, we generally start with a stock vehicle, and slowly add componentry to make it a formidable track-day weapon. Also, like most of us, when you purchase that next vehicle of choice, it will see track duty far before such upgrades have been made.

This is where things get tricky. Trust me, as I have been down this road a time or two. Usually a vehicle upgrade is not from a 924 with harnesses to a new GT2. Generally they are modest upgrades on an original As a result, you may not be as theme. happy with the new ride as you first expected. You may even run slower lap times, and have a little buver's remorse. Don't get too down at this point. Both the car and you the driver have a long way to go in getting acquainted with one another. I am a firm believer that it's a good process to understand the base vehicle and all of its goods and bads before making upgrades. Additionally, you may wish to start a logbook to track vehicle/driver performance throughout the build-up process.

As the new track car is nearly stock, I would assume it under-steers significantly worse than you expected. Don't worry, that's manufacturer street tuning for safety considerations. You may also be underwhelmed with the result of 75 more horsepower. Again, don't worry she'll come alive later in the process. At this point start understanding the natural response of the new vehicle as you come up to speed. At the same time you'll be retraining the driver on handling a new machine. Be patient, this takes time. As you become more and more familiar with the new car, you can begin to add upgrades. Wheels, tires, coil-

overs, control arms, seats, harnesses, coolers, weight removal, and so on.

Somewhere along the way, you begin setting new personal best lap times. About then it hits you, 'I really like this new car'. Remember it's a journey. Every once in a while that journey includes purchasing a new 'prepared' track car. While the car will initially feel better, the driver requires the same adaptation process. Don't rush the learning and adaptation. There is much to be absorbed along the way about the car,

and even more to be learned about the driver. Good luck, and I hope to see you in that new track-car soon!



# TECH SESSION by Jim Brandon

## **VW 101**

Bluegrass region held a Tech Session on Saturday, 20 August at Jim Brandon's garage. The subject of the session was the familiarization and disassembly of a 1967 Volkswagen 1500 cc engine. The engine was removed from (coincidentally) a 1967 Porsche 912. The engine had experienced rainwater/rust damage in one cylinder and we are not sure if the engine ever ran in the Porsche. The VW engine was a good candidate for a Tech Session since there are many similarities between the VW 4 cylinder boxer engine and the engines in the Porsche 356, 912, and 914.

The Session was "hands on" so the intrepid few started disassembly by removing the alternator/cooling fan/shroud assembly. followed by the carburetor and intake manifold. fuel pump, oil cooler, and generator pedestal. All parts removed were carefully tossed on the nearest workbench in a neat, orderly pile. The engine was now reduced to a "long block"



The disassemblers then attacked the long block, removing the rocker shafts, pushrods, and heads. At this point we could see the top of the pistons and it was noted that the 1500cc engine had already be up-sized to 1600cc with cylinders and pistons. The piston and cylinders were quickly removed and added to the aforementioned pile. This left just the crankcase, crankshaft and camshaft.

The crankcase was "split" revealing the crankshaft, camshaft and lifters. As with the piston/cylinders, it was noted that the engine had also been fitted with a remanufactured crankshaft which had been modified





with the addition of welded-on counterweights and additional dowel pins to improve flywheel mounting. At this point the group discussed shimming to control crankshaft endplay, alignment of timing marks, distributor drive and fuel pump drive mechanism. We also reviewed how the camshaft with four lobes can operate eight pushrods and valves.



After about an hour, the group (14 Bluegrass Region members and one guest) had the engine down to a bare crankcase and a big pile of parts on the workbench...mission accomplished.











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# PCC @ BIG ASS FAN August 27

## Our event at Big Ass Solutions was one of our most successful.

We had 41 attendees bringing 29 vehicles. It was very neat in that for eight of the attendees, this was their first event. BAS treated us to a sit down coffee and donuts session where they described their very progressive approach to sales, their product lines and their very positive employee work environment. Next they toured us through their well-designed administration facility, describing the over 30 different types of fans in use. With no ventilation duct work and all individual work areas climate controlled by the individual locally, BAS puts their product to practice. We wrapped the visit up with a series of photo shoots. In addition to the group photo taken by Rey and Helena, BAS took individual photos of any BGS member and their car as requested.

# ADVERTISER SHOWCASE by Patrick Meyer

Foreign Affairs Autowerks has a lot going on these days. They provide repair services to all makes and models of cars, foreign and domestic, but are especially known for servicing Porsches. They have factory Porsche software which enables them to diagnose and repair what ails your car, which is what you would expect when the proprietor is Porsche "gold."

Brian Wooldridge is a Porsche certified Gold Meister technician. After auto tech school, he attended Porsche's own technical school and put his talents to work at the Lexington Porsche dealership. When the dealership closed in 2010 he opened Foreign Affairs Autowerks with his brother, Scott, at a small shop on Jefferson Street. After outgrowing that space they moved to their current location at 624 W. 4th Street, at the corner of 4th and Newtown Pike. Scott Wooldridge manages auto detailing services and consignment sales.



Scott has been detailing cars since he was 20 years old, first in Southern Indiana and now in Lexington with Foreign Affairs. He offers a full range of detailing services including Concours / Show Prep. Cleaning cars is one thing, "but detailing is like an art," Scott says. Incidentally, you may have seen Scott judging cars at the Keeneland Concours d'Elegance, so you know he truly understands the



efforts – and the artistry -- needed to make a car stand out.

As for consignment sales, Scott notes "many of our customers have great cars they wish to sell, but don't want to handle the sales process. We make sure the cars are mechanically sound and clean before they're put on the market." Foreign Affairs charges a small fee based on the sales price for consignments (in addition to any preparation and repair costs needed).

At the front desk you'll find Shane Pope managing the schedule, billing, parts, supplies and a myriad of other tasks. Brian, Scott, Shane and the three main technicians in the shop take pride in their work and are always available for questions and help, but they keep it loose and have fun, too. "I've been here 3 years and I'm still being hazed," laments Shane.

While they're comfortable with a variety of foreign makes "we have a lot of expertise with Porsche 996s, 997s and Boxsters," Scott says. Another specialty is alignments. Foreign Affairs has a state of the art alignment rack to straighten out even the trickiest steering systems. "Most people think your



car is aligned if your steering wheel is straight. There's a lot more to it than that," Scott adds.

There could be changes on the horizon for Foreign Affairs. Space is becoming limited and they are on the hunt for a new building. "Our landlord has other long-term plans for this property, so we'd like to buy our own place and expand," says Brian. They prefer to stay near downtown Lexington. "A lot of our customers are in this area."

Gazing at the cars in the shop you get a sense of the skills and talent Brian and his team of technicians possess. On the day Rey, Helena and I stopped in for pictures and interview notes the garage was full of an eclectic mix of motoring eye



candy. A Porsche 944 on the rack, a classic Corvette with the hood tilted forward, a red Lamborghini Countach seemingly just in from a bedroom poster shoot, a black Mercedes convertible, a Triumph TR6, a silver Porsche 928 awaiting its return to glory, and an early Maserati Quattroporte that spent much of its life in an Italian car park.

"We can work on just about anything," Scott admits.

"We're like the Gas Monkey Garage," Shane adds with a dry wit, "but without all of the antics."

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
