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

TRACK TIME

2014: A Great Year for Road Racing and Motorsports. I announced last month that we have entered the official "off-season" for motorsports. Well, I'm bored of that statement. As I look around, 2014 seems to have the potential for the start of something magical in motorsports. Formula 1 continues to grow in popularity and international reach. Personal Comment: I am a huge fan of Formula 1. The sport pits the best drivers on earth, in the most advanced cars on earth against one another. Currently there are 5 F1 world champions on track together, and no love lost between manufacturers, drivers, and sport management. Four-time champion Sebastian Vettel will be fighting to win his fifth championship in a row. He is a true superstar, and may likely retire as the greatest F1 driver in history. Watch him while you can, it is a bit like watching Michael Jordan playing with the Bulls. His very talented teammate Mark Webber has just left the sport (on top - I might add) to join POR-SCHE in their prototype campaign for a Le Mans win. Worldwide, racing championships like the WEC - World Endurance Championship, the FIA GT1 World Championship, the WTCC - World Touring Car Championship, and DTM - Deutsche Tourenwagen Masters are more exciting than ever (and available to watch on US cable TV). However, quality road racing series are not limited to Europe any longer.

In the US, we have our own road racing series that rival any from Europe or Asia. First, the Pirelli World Challenge is a great series that features 4 classes from entry-level "touring car B-spec" to the amazing "Grand Touring" cars. The spec series, Ferrari Challenge (Ferrari 458-based race

cars), and IMSA GT3 Cup Challenge (911 GT3 Cup based race cars) are fun to watch and act as a feeder series to higher-level pro racing. This leads us to the IMSA Continental Tire Sports Car Challenge. The CTSCC is a fun professional series where two classes of production-based racecars (Grand Sport (GS) and Street Tuner (ST)) fight for a national championship. Porsche cars are quite prevalent in the CTSCC.

Finally, and perhaps most importantly, the owners of Grand -AM and ALMS – American Le Mans Series (America's two premiere road racing series) have merged, and 2014 represents the first year where the merged series the IMSA Tudor United SportsCar Championship (TUSC) will compete. The TUSC is significant! It unifies the highest level of prototype and sports car racing in the US. The series features four vehicle classes on-track concurrently:

Prototype: Grand-Am Daytona Prototypes, ALMS P2, and DeltaWing cars

Prototype Challenge: ALMS open-top prototype race cars

GT Le Mans: ALMS Grand Touring class cars (the most advanced production-based race cars)

GT Daytona: Grand-AM GT, Grand-AM GX, and ALMS GTC cars

This series features factory supported racecars and drivers (including many from Porsche) as well as the best private teams in the business. There are over 40 teams and well
























PORSCHE MACAN

Porsche says the Macan (pronounced Mah-Kahn) is its entry into the compact SUV segment. From the photos and video I have seen the Macan's proportions appear much tighter, much leaner than the Cayenne.

An additional 40 millimeters of ground clearance can be achieved, with an available air suspension system.

The all-wheel drive layout is biased to the rear under normal driving conditions. It is able to transmit up to 100% of the torque to the front axle as required. An off-road mode is standard.

There are two trim levels for Macan, starting with the Macan S (MSRP: \$49,900) and the Macan Turbo (MSRP \$72,300).

The Macan S is no base model. For my money it is the best buy. With a 3.0-litre Twin Turbo V6 It's good for 340 horsepower and 339 lb-ft of torque. This is good for a 0-60 sprint of 5.0 seconds with the optional Sport Chrono package. The Macan Turbo gets a stroked 3.6-litre version with 400 horsepower and 406 lb-ft of torque that is good for 0-60 in 4.4 seconds with Sport Chrono.

A seven-speed PDK is used for both turbo plants, with identical ratios through the gears. There's a standard engine Start/Stop system for maximizing efficiency.

Since both vehicles are turbo charged I am not sure why they call one an 'S' and the other a 'Turbo'.



It seems to me it should be a 'Turbo and a Turbo S'. But hey, that is just my opinion.

The Macan gets a multi-function steering wheel with shift paddles, borrowing cues from the 918 Spyder.

The Macan gets leather seating as

standard equipment, with Alcantara inserts. The center tunnel gets similar banks of outlying switches, much like the current Cayenne and Panamera. The S gets a seveninch touchscreen, while the Turbo adds the Navigation to it.

I have never really been a fan of the SUV per say. I have always

owned small compact cars and sports cars. I think the biggest car I had was a Honda CRV when they first came out. From what I have seen in pictures and video of the Macan, it is definitely a car I would own. It looks great! It is well propor-

tioned and the performance specs are off the charts! I'll be glad to park one in the garage next to my 996. I guess that means Michelle would be driving it every day. I can't wait to see it in person.



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
