

TRACK TIME

Last month we covered heel-toe shifting; a necessary technique for high-performance driving in a traditional manual transmission vehicle. Since that article I had the good fortune to practice that technique at Putnam Park road course. June 7-9 was one of the year's very best PCA Driver Education events, "Summer Heat", sponsored by Blue Grass Motorsport and the Kentucky Region PCA. Each year, this event is run in June and September. From my perspective, these are the premiere events of the year for novice track drivers.

Putnam Park is a 10-turn 1.78-mile long course located in Mount Meridian, IN (about 30 miles west of Indianapolis). While the track lacks the visual impact of a Barber Motorsports Park, Road Atlanta, or Mid-Ohio, it is one of the best tracks in America to learn high performance driving. The track feels more like a farm than a racecourse, but that's great. There is ample run -off space in the grass around the track, minimizing the potential for vehicle damage. The course's ten turns are all challenging and different from one another. For those of us lucky enough to run at Putnam frequently, it is apparent that the only way to achieve good lap times at Putnam is to employ superior race technique. Putnam rewards quality driving. If there is a negative at Putnam Park, it is the cheese-grater like surface of the track that eats tires. I destroyed 6 new race tires over the weekend. Beyond the track, the success of the KY PCA region events at Putnam lies with the people. First and foremost, the Kentucky region track

-staff do a great job of putting on an event. They employ a superb set of instructors that are hand selected based on experience and nowhow. Most of the instructor group know one another and have driven together for years. And the icing on the cake, is the Blue Grass Motorsport personnel. The Louisvillebased dealership not only bring a variety of Porsche vehicles to the track for inspection, but bring two of the country's best Porsche Sport Driving School instructors to provide taxi rides on the track in new Porsche vehicles (911 S and Cayman S at this event). In addition to drivers and cars. Blue Grass mans the technical inspection garage, sponsors lunch for the instructors each day of the event, and best of all provides a free event social Friday and Saturday evenings (dinner, open bar, track video, and socializing with fellow participants). These amenities are unmatched at any DE event across the country.

It was amazing to see the wide variety of vehicles at this event. Beyond the usual large contingent of Porsche 991s, Caymans, and 944s, there were an abundance of Porsche specialty vehicles as well. You couldn't open your eyes without seeing a compliment of GT3s, GT3RSs, Turbo S, and even a new GT2RS at the track. These were not just show cars, these guys drove them and pushed them hard. However, as in most endeavors in life, it was the participants, organizers, and track personnel that made the weekend memorable.
