



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

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
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Recent Club Events

I contacted Putnam Park and they have no weekends available in 2005 or 2006. So at the moment I don't have a workable plan for BGR to put on a DE any time soon, but that's still my goal. And shortly I'll be sending out my "DE Interest" questionnaire.

I just got back from the TracQuest event at Mid-Ohio. It reminded me that there are two ways to structure an event. PCA events usually have four or five run groups which each get four, or more likely three, track sessions per day. Some private organizers--TracQuest and Chin Motorsports, maybe others--accept fewer entries and have fewer run groups. This gets the entrant lots more track time but means the track rental is spread over fewer entrants and the entry fee is much higher. At the TracQuest event I got 11 half-hour sessions (and skipped one). But I paid \$495 rather than the \$260 or \$300 that a PCA event would have been.

Central Indiana's Pumpkin Run 2 is October 29 and 30. They are again going to be offering the one-day "Intro to DE" program; for around \$40 you get the classroom instruction, the T-shirt, and rides in instructors' cars (and are covered by the event insurance). The idea is to help you decide if entering a future DE with your car is something you'd want to do. I'll be pressuring you all to sign up for either the DE or the Intro and we'll make it a pseudo-BGS event.


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Tech Tips

Jacking Up Your Boxster or 996

Periodically, I like to jack up my car, get under it, and look it over carefully. I check for loose fasteners, damage to the undercarriage or suspension, and exhaust leaks. This is also a good opportunity to look for oil, coolant, or brake fluid leaks. For personal safety, I always support the car with jack stands before I get under it. The Boxster or 996 requires a slightly different approach to jack it up. The jack points are oval-shaped sockets in the bottom of the car, and the



underside of the car doesn't have any obvious places to put jack stands. Pelican Parts now offers a custom floor jack adapter, specifically for the Boxster and 996, which allows the car to be jacked up safely. It comes in a nice zipper bag for storage (Figure 1), and it has an extended tang that fits exactly into the

jack socket (Figure 2).

The adapter even has a tough rubber pad to prevent marring the undercarriage (Figure 3). If your floor jack is like mine, it is too tall to fit under the Boxster without removing the saddle





from the jack. The saddle on my jack just lifts off, and then the jack fits nicely under the car, using the new adapter (Figure 4). I was reluctant to use jack



stands with bare metal tops on my new Boxster. I decided to pad the top of each jack stand with a hockey puck (Figure 5). I attached the puck to the jack stand by drilling a 6mm hole through it, with a slight countersink. I then drilled and tapped a hole in the top of each jack stand, and attached the hockey pucks using 6mm X 30mm bolts. The pucks are very hard rub-



ber, so they should hold up well, but still conform to the shape of the jack socket (Figure 6). With this setup, I can jack up my Boxster without damaging anything, and feel safe while working underneath it. It isn't due for an oil change yet, but I'll be ready for that, too.



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

914 1973 2.0

Q:Have decided to replace the 31 year old fuel lines in our much loved 914 2.0. My research say we should also move the fuel pump to the front trunk. Is there a special location or tip I should know of? I've also read that some people leave in the original plastic lines in the tunnel. Thanks in advance

A:You could go to the trouble of mounting it like the 75/76 models, but I don't think it's worth the trouble. I think an easier place is just above the steering protection pan. You can mount it to the bulkhead in front of the pass. footwell. Use rubber cushion mounts or else it will transfer noise and vibration into the car. Always look on other side of panel before you drill! You could also mount it directly to the protection pan. Long ago I would have said to leave the original lines alone, but now they're getting so old it's probably a good idea to replace them. We used to be able to get the original plastic hose from the Wurth Co., but they no longer carry it. I think a good alternative might be soft alum. tubing, haven't done this yet, just thinking out loud! Whether steel or alum. the tricky part will be running them through the tunnel and into the proper brackets. Take out the seat to give yourself better access. Ed Mayo - PCA WebSite - 3/2/2004

997 (New 911) Engine

Q: Please give me some details on the new engines in the 997. I'm interested in knowing whether they are the "race-bred" versions like the 996 Turbo and GT3 or the more "mainstream" version like the those in the 996 C4S and 996 coupe and cabs. I also noticed that the new gauge cluster in the 997 has an oil temperature gauge instead of the voltmeter in the 996. Is the oil lubrication system different in the 997 than the 996 or the 996 Turbo and GT3?

A:The engine in the 997 and the GT3's and Turbo's are completely different. It is about as different as Ford and Chevy engines. The GT3's and Turbo's use a 993 air cooled type case and modified it for water cooling systems, whereas the 997 motor, which is similar to the 996 motors was designed for water the first day on the drawing board. The oiling system is identical to the 996 normal street cars.Peter Smith - PCA WebSite - 5/26/2005

Targa top leaks

Q:I bought my 914 last year and I have been replacing things piece by piece. I bought Targa top side seals that fit the top to the top of the window. I would have sworn that the dry rotted seals that I took off had a contoured rubber block molded into the seal on the forward end that fits it snugly and exactly opposite to the top seal block at the top outboard of the wind screen. The replacements that I bought from a supplier as original equipment do not have this rubber block, and they maintain that I got all that there is to get. Is there a seal that fits to the top seal better, and do you have any general advice about sealing up rain leaks in the 914?

A: The end of the seal above the door glass does not have a finished end where it touches the windshield seal. Rather, it has a piece of closed cell, high density foam rubber rubber glued in place. It is about 1/2" to 3/4" long, and is contoured to fit inside of the hollow seal, and simply plugs the end. In fact, the rubber isn't even black, more of a dark grey. If your new seals did not come with this plug, I'd remove them from your old seals and glue them into the new ones. You could also cut your own out of a piece of foam. Other than new seals, and adjusting the door glass so that it fits to the seals as tightly as possible, there isn't much you can do. The glass can be adjusted in and out at the top, and the top of the glass can be adjusted up and down. Both adjustments are on the underside of the door, towards the front of the door. The original seals shrink over time causing more leaks, so your new ones should help. The seals can be adjusted slightly side to side by loosening the small screws that hold the metal channels for the seals in place. A car cover or an umbrella style cover that just covers the top and glass of the car when parked is the only real solution. Jon Lowe - PCA WebSite - 7/19/2002

Using ATE brake fluid in 1988 944 Turbo S

Q:I experienced brake fade during drivers ed events and was informed that I should use ATE super blue fluid. I did so and find excellent brake characteristics. However, I wonder if the ATE super blue fluid will affect the brake components, such as seals. Also, does it affect the clutch hydraulic components? Second question: Must I also bleed my clutch after bleeding brakes? I was informed that this was unnecessary. I am a member of PCA for 20 years and have owned a 924 and an '83 944, but the '88 turbo S is an incredible vehicle. When I discussed preventative maintenance for this vehicle with our mechanical guru he told me the only concern was the main bearings, so I changed them. Any other thoughts for this 201,000 mile beauty?


A:I have found the ATE super blue to be an excellent brake fluid. Its use will not accelerate the failure of any of the hydraulic components, on either the brakes or the clutch side.Bleeding the clutch, while it is something that is usually neglected until it is necessary (i.e. when the clutch master cylinder or clutch slave cylinder fails) is not necessary every time you bleed the brakes for track events.I do recommend that you flush the brake fluid, including the fluid in the clutch hydraulics, every year, and bleed the brakes before every track event.While the turbo S is indeed an incredible vehicle, it does require a good amount of maintenance, including regular attendance to fluid levels (don't forget the transaxle fluid, which should be changed every 30K miles.) In addition, I recommend gentle acceleration from full stops, saving the massive forward thrust until you have reached a good clip. This will help keep your clutch intact and save you a ton of money.

Millennium 996 wheel finish

Q:My wife and I own a Millennium edition 996. The car is garage kept and driven only in nice weather on the occasional weekend. The car is perfect, except the "turbo look" wheels are loosing their finish. The chrome paint comes off in large pieces on all four wheels. I have had two wheels replaced under warranty, and could not be more pleased with the car in general. However I have yet to receive an acceptable answer for the cause of this problem. If I understood the cause, I would certainly take steps to prevent the new wheels from failing. Any suggestions? Thank you in advance for your assistance.

A:I have recently seen the finish you describe. It is the same as the 993 Turbo S rims. The finish is a powdercoat silver/clearcoat. If the wheels are nicked it could cause failure of the finish. Once the clear is damaged it cannot be repaired without total stripping and recoating. The finish is simular to satin chrome. I would clean the wheels with P21S paint cleanser and wax them with P21s carnauba wax to preserve them. This same care should be used on silver painted alloy wheels normally offered on all late model Porsches. John Paterek - PCA WebSite - 12/12/2004
