




# February membership meeting features guest speaker, door prize drawing



Eighty cars were exhibited this year in the 50,000 squarefoot facility at Porsche of the Village on February 26th.

Last year's Family Tree show featured 50 cars. Certified Sales Leader Bruce Harnish thinks he Stuttgart Motors of Lexington. can fit a few more cars into next year's show, but that's going to be a challenge, simply because the show this year drew more enthusiasts than last year's show and, given the impressive display this year. more visitors should be expected next year. There were so many people this year that taking photos was a challenge!

The first room off valet parking is large enough for only three cars to be exhibited, The vellow 1964 356 C co-owned by Richard and Robert McClelland being one of the

three this year.

The next room, normally the Volvo showroom, featured up facing the showroom glass. Registration, coat check and lanyards were available in this welcoming space.

The wide, brick-surfaced corridor providing entrance to the service area featured vendors, including Dan Puchalski of Three food and drink stations also were situated in this space.


Again, Bruce Harnish seems to be planning an even larger event for next year. If you missed this one, be sure to make next year's event.




1977 930 odometer shows 11,000 total miles.




